very year at this time, I love to sit at my desk and watch the local farmers begin to harvest the beans, corn and even tomatoes from the surrounding fields. And, each and every year my thoughts run to the

verses from scripture that speak about the fields being white to harvest, but the laborers being few.

While reading these sections from the Gospels of Matthew, Luke and John, I purposefully tried to glean something from the text that I had not realized before. My take on these passages has always been framed by the thought that there is a lot of work to do, but not many workers to do it. (Everybody can do what somebody should do, but because nobody does it, it doesn't get done!) Can you identify with that?

Well, as I share my recent discovery with you, I would ask that you give me latitude to use it to try and make a connection between the ministry at Shults-Lewis, and the relationship you have to us as a donor/supporter. I have continually missed the reference made by Jesus back to the book of Job (31:8), when he said, "Thus the saying, One sows and another reaps is true." He continues by saying, "Others have done the hard work, and you have reaped the benefits of their labor" (vs. 38).

I will leave it to you to decide whether our donors and supporters are the sowers and Shults-Lewis the reapers, or vice versa. The argument could be made that without the financial support of donors and friends like you, Shults-Lewis would no longer be able to provide for children and their families who are struggling, and that is certainly true! On the other hand, you reap the benefits of the seed being sown in this ministry as troubled youth are exposed to what life can be like when God's plan is followed. They see God's love displayed on a daily basis in Christian homes, and in their school where God is spoken about freely, and by an entire staff that loves God deeply and is committed to serving children in this capacity.

Regardless of which side of the fence you fall on this discussion, one thing is perfectly clear – we need to open our eyes, and look at the fields, for they are indeed ripe for harvest!!! We need you, and my prayer is that you see this ministry as needed, and will make a concerted effort to do what you can to assist us in finishing the work that Jesus began as He fulfilled the will of the Father.

## **School Happenings**

t this writing we are halfway through the first quarter which began with something new for both students and teachers. Through the company Odysseyware, our school began online classes for

each student. This new online program allows for the regular core classes with the kids completing assignments and research projects of various topics and subjects.

In addition, this also allows the kids to take elective classes that were previously unavailable. They are able to pick electives that are of interest to them and their future plans and goals. One girl wants to be a veterinarian and is taking a class in Animal Systems. One wants to be a Cosmetologist and is taking Personal Care. For the one that is thinking about being a lawyer there is a class for Legal Services.


The program is individualized to each students' needs and interests. They work at their pace and if they take a quiz or test and do not receive a passing score, they retake it, which allows for correcting a previous error and learning the right answer before they can move on to the next section. This self-paced learning has encouraged some to take the initiative and follow through with their studies.

The teachers are still in the classrooms, monitoring each students' progress, assisting them when further understanding is needed and grading essays that are completed. Since the classes are self-paced, the teachers also encourage them to stay on task.

We are encouraged by the kids embracing this new style of education within our program.
