What is Buzzing in Social Services?

Our Program department is ever growing and changing as we seek to incorporate Jesus into our treatment for traumatized kids. As a facility looking to be an organization of distinction, we are continually looking for ways to better our program and truly meet the needs of the children and families we serve. One way we are looking to grow is by seeking council

from our fellow Network 1:27 children's home leaders. We owe a big thank you to Tennessee Children's Home, Spring Hill, for their willingness to mentor us as we grow our program.

Our Executive Director and I are planning a trip there in a few weeks to shadow their leadership staff and learn from their expertise. We are so thankful God puts fellow Christians in our path to help us become better as we strive to help the children and families we work with also become better.

Our work is multi-faceted in that we are teaching life skills, which include the spiritual, physical, educational, emotional, social, and mental aspects of living. As we move from the traditional children's home to a treatment facility we are working to implement a day by day schedule which provides our youth with consistency and stability. We've always had a conventional school on campus that operated as a separate part of the home environment, we are now incorporating schooling into our treatment schedule.

Kids start the day with their morning routine of Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and breakfast after which they will transition to the Shults Lewis Youth Development Center. Following our morning chapel, the kids attend their goals group where they are guided in setting their own goals for the day based on their individualized treatment plan. Our Campus Assistant, lead teacher, and tutor will "encourage one

another daily, as long as it is called "today" so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness." (Hebrews 3:13)

After setting their daily goal, the kids engage in the education focused part of their day using both online curriculum and instructional work with our teacher/tutors before heading to lunch. Then the fun begins! Our EQUIP Program groups are designed to teach kids anger management, social decision making, and social skills using a cognitive approach. "We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ." (2 Corinthians 10:5) Phrases like thinking errors and problem names are becoming a daily part of our language at Shults Lewis as we work with the kids to capture our thoughts and replace them with Christ-like attitudes.

After our EQUIP group, kids participate in a time of hands-on learning designed to get them out of their seats. Some days that involves equine therapy, some days it involves physical education (PE), and some days it involves lab time where they may dissect a frog or grow cultures.

Once the kids return to their respective (boys and girls) homes for the day they are involved in homework/personal therapy assignment time, structured games, dinner, chores, ADL's, packing their lunch for the next day, and finally a goals group to review how they did that day in meeting the goal they set for themselves that morning. Was I successful in reaching my goal today? What did I do well today? What do I need to continue working on? How do I feel about my work today? Those are the questions they ask themselves as they self-evaluate their progress. And the process of self-evaluation is one we strive to model for our kids. After all, our own daily goals are to stay faithful to God and show others the way to heaven.
